Minutes for November 22, 2022 Vernon Baseball Association AGM

Meeting called to order by Michael Sanfilippo, President at 7:00 pm.

Review of 2021 AGM Minutes

Questions? No. Michael recommended that the minutes of the November 23, 2020 AGM be accepted as circulated. Motioned by Dan Braddick. All in favor. Minutes adopted.

Financial Statement and Treasurer's report: Jason Gilbert reported we had another successful year financially with registrations up! VMB utilized \$5000 to complete pitching mounds at Marshal Fields. \$30,000 will be held for special projects like Lake View resurfacing, enclosed bullpens that will need to be completed with the next 5 year. Costs for jerseys and umpires were up this year. BC government did provide \$21,000 in the Gaming Funds.

Matthew Brown motioned to recommend the acceptance of the financial statements. All in favor.

President's report. Michael Sanfilippo: Very happy with the increase in registration of 344 kids. T-Bal 77, Tadpole 93, Mosquito 71, Pee Wee 51, Bantam 32, Midget 25. The league made huge steps forward with improving the quality of the fields as well as 4 installed score boards. Again, a big thank you to the executive team, coaches, umpires, volunteers, and sponsors for all their support. Baseball isn't possible without all your hard work and contributions.

Executive Reports

- Vice-President Jeff Stevenson: Great to see lots of new faces and leaning the roll. looking forward to another successful year in 2023 as Vice President.
- Registrar-Shannon Sanfilippo: Another great year with 344 kids registered up from 273 in 2021 and 159 in 2020. VBA is pleased to continue working the following organizations Jumpstart, Kids Sports, and A4k in the upcoming 2023 baseball season.
- Field Manager report Matt Davyduke: Many field upgrades starting with the rebuilding of Marshal Fields, enclosed bull pens for the 18U and potential bull pens in the future for the 15U, a new tractor for Marshal Field. The field closest to the road at Creekside park was a mess after 2 years of no use due to the poor back stop. With the help of city crews and volunteers we were able to get the field playable. We are still waiting and could be for a while to see if the city will raise the back stop or hang a net at the top to prevent foul

balls from going into the homes behind the field. With the new irrigation at Creekside the fields stayed in better shape. Matt made arrangements with the city crew to truck in the same shale as McArthur Park in Kamloops which will be top dressed this spring. Lake View parks were well maintained this season. The old Lawn tractor from Marshal Field will be relocated to the new building for those fields.

Lavington, Armory, and Coldstream Park were good with no complaints. There is talk from the city about making a second ball field at the far end of Coldstream Park for T-ball.

- Equipment Manager Jason Coulter: Currently equipment is well situated. Moving
 forward we will need to purchase bats and some miscellaneous equipment. Currently
 suppliers are short in sock. This year we purchased a new Hack Attack pitching machine
 for the outdoor cage at Coldstream that can be used at Creekside as well. 60 dozen
 Rawlings baseballs which should cover us for the next couple of seasons as well as
 Level 1 and 5 baseballs for Tadpole and Tadpole summer ball.
- Uniform Manager Janet Coulter: We were able to order locally from Source for Sports
 for the spring and summer teams which consisted of T-shirts and hats that the kids were
 able to keep. T-ball and Tadpole shirts were provided by Tim Hortons. From this year's
 budget we pre ordered the bulk of jerseys for next season. We also ordered two sets of
 jerseys that will be used for the beginning of summer ball to hold over for our summer
 teams until the custom ones arrive. These jerseys are expected to be returned once the
 custom ones have arrived.
- Communications Director report Jennifer Brown: Registration started early this
 season. Advertising through radio ads, newspaper, and social media. Vernon Baseball
 website remains the best and fastest way to access baseball information. This includes
 registration, camps, academy, umpires and more. Our website team Sayvee is very
 professional and easy to work with.
- Umpire-In-Chief report Stu Cleland: Strong return for umpiring crew. Stu recommends planning for 2 separate clints as number of participants is overwhelming. Special recognition to Leo Gauthier, Pat Balfour, Jack Curry and Clarence Bodden for their dedication and willingness to not only work games but mentoring and shaping our younger umpires throughout the year without being asked. Another special thanks to Clorissa Herman for doing a great job for organizing umpires for games from start to finish. Big thanks again to coaches for directors for adhering so strongly to the "zero tolerance" for abuse policy has profound positive impact on our crew and will make it far more likely that they will return in the future.
- T-Ball Director report Carl Vardon: This year was a great year for T-Ball Players. 8
 Teams of boys and girls sponsored by Tim Horton's enjoyed a fun season and were able
 to make friends and develop some fundamental baseball skills with the help from many
 knowledgeable coaches.
- Tadpole Director report Jessica Davis: A changed in our fields this year which
 received a lot of positive feedback, as the school fields were never popular in the past.
 We played at Lavington, Armoury and Coldstream Park. There was a summer team
 again this year that held 13 kids. It was awesome for the kids to play at a more
 competitive level.

- Mosquito Director Dan Braddick: Spring Ball 2022 Mosquito Baseball season saw 71 players on 6 teams. Evaluations were held in Mid-April. The coaches ran different drill stations to help determine the skill of each player so that we could do our best to make the teams as even as possible. The teams played a 10-game season followed by a seeded double elimination playoff. Summer ball this year consisted of an 11U AAA team. This year the team participated in a few tournaments and some weekend double headers which lead them to the Provincials in Cloverdale.
- Pee Wee Director Matthew Brown: The Pee Wee group had about 51 players split into 3 Single A teams and 1 AA team. The single A's finished the season in a final double elimination tournament with a fantastic final game held in Salmon Arm with a win by the Vernon! The AA team participated in the Interior Zone game schedule of approximately 40 games including three tournaments. Vernon had a solid winning record heading into the zone tournament but unfortunately came up short in the last game and did not qualify for the provincial tournament.
- Bantam Director Robert Holmes: Bantams had two spring teams, we played in an interlock league with Salmon Arm's two teams as well as Enderby/Grindrod and Summerland. The players looking for more ball from the two Vernon teams tried out and formed a competitive summer team. We played games vs Salmon Arm and Kelowna in July as well as playing in Kelowna's famous Valley of the Champions tournament. Vernon qualified for the Provincial tournament held the second week of August in Maple Ridge. We played our first season on the new mound and infield at Marshall. Our fields and mound are the Envy of all the teams we played.
- Midget Director Dan Braddick: This season saw 25 players allowing us to form 2 AA teams that were evenly matched and allowed our graduating players to play alongside their closest friends in finishing their youth baseball Career. The teams played in an interior division for the Spring season that saw them face 2 teams from Kelowna, 1 team from Summerland and 1 team from Salmon Arm. Both Vernon teams finished on top of the league. We then held a North and South playoff that saw Vernon win the league. Vernon formed 1 summer team to participate in the Provincials held in Ladner. We unfortunately had no teams in the Interior to play against and went to the Provincials as a team that had only practiced. Another bright side of the Provincials was the invitation of Brennan Braddick and me to participate on the Provincial champion Vancouver Mounties at Westerns in Estavan Saskatchewan. Brennan played 2 roles for the team as both Catcher and Pitcher and I went as the first base coach. The team played well and jelled as a group right away leading them to become the 2022 Western Canadian 18UAA Champions.

Questions from the floor

With the information from the field manager about a second field at the Creekside park Ryan Novakowski pointed out that there is barely enough parking for two teams at the Coldstream park. If there was another field traffic and parking would be impossible. Matthew Davyduke will bring this up to the District of Coldstream.

What's the status of the Scoreboards for Creekside? We will continue using the old wooden ones. In previous years the district was opposed to installing new score boards as they were concerned about vandalism. With new council members and Mayor we will continue to communicate with them and work towards this goal of the digital score bords.

Consideration of the Financial Statements - Treasurer's Report

Attached are the financial statements for the year ended October 31, 2023.

The organization had another successful year financially. Registrations were up this year and we were able to hold expenses at a reasonable level. We utilized \$15,000 (previously reserved funds) to complete the fencing of the bullpens at Marshall Fields. We also have worked with the City of Vernon to erect a fence to separate the dog park and the ball players at Marshall Fields. We also helped with costs associated with our storage locker at Lakeview Park.

At the VBA board meeting in October the board approved the restriction of \$30,000 for two major projects, the resurfacing of Lakeview Field #1 (\$15,000) and the resurfacing of Lakeview Field #2 (\$15,000). These projects will need to be completed within the next 4-5 years.

We hosted a very successful Mosquito Provincials. Financially it contributed approximately \$2,300 towards our association. Thank you to all the volunteers and participants.

Thank you to the BC Government as they provided \$21,000 in gaming funds to the association. This grant goes a long way to ensuring that baseball remains affordable for all to play.

I am happy to report we ended the season after all the upgrades with a deficit of \$10,479.03 for the year.

President's Report

The 2023 baseball season saw 351 players playing in our Vernon leagues, a slight uptick from the prior year of 344. Registrations overall were good and matched the support we had for volunteer coaches in our divisions.

Our T-Ball division (7U) had a very solid year with 70 participants coming out to play ball. This level is so often driven and led to success by the parents and volunteers of the kids as coaches and helpers both on field and off. This season was no different with a great group of coaches and Carl's outstanding passion for the game. Tadpole (9U) was able to offer some solid skill building practices and several games for the 86 kids who registered. Tadpole also had a summer ball group that played in several weekend round robins and added some great competitive game level baseball for our young kids. In the Mosquito division (11U), we had 72 kids split up into 6 very competitive teams. A summer ball team was also formed at Mosquito and a great group of parents and volunteers hosted an exceptional Provincials. Pee Wee (13U) had a total of 3 Single A teams and one AA team and totaled 58 kids. Development around balks, leadoffs and pick off moves generated exciting baseball throughout the season. The Pee Wee AA team played a full season with a few major tournaments and a provincial birth in the 13U AA Provincial while the A teams played a 14-game season including a weekend Double elimination midseason tournament and ended with a wrap up double elimination playoff. Bantam (15U) featured 39 kids and three Single A teams that had a very successful season of development and 12 games and a playoff with a local interlock. A summer ball team was also put together and played a handful of games into the summer and won a birth to their Provincial for some August baseball. The Midget division (18U) had a great season with return to interlock baseball. We had 26 kids in total and 2 AA teams. A lot of hard work and effort by the director and coaches managed to put together some great competitive local games. A summer ball team was pulled together and won a birth to Provincials to extend an already great season. All told we had Provincial level teams at all levels from Mosquito to Midget for the second consecutive year.

I can't say enough about what the community of parents and volunteers did again this year to pull another fantastic season together for the kids. As a board we worked through a number of unique challenges and provided an exceptional year to the kids. As a league we made huge steps forward in the quality of our fields, Lakeview has never looked better and the work put into the fencing at Marshall Field will provide us the opportunity to host a Provincial at 15U and 18U in years to come.

A special thank you to our executive team, coaches, umpires, volunteers & sponsors for their support this past season. Baseball isn't possible without your hard work & contributions.

My intent in taking on the role of UIC was to mentor and train the younger umpires. Unfortunately, due to the shortage of umpires at the senior levels, it became necessary for me to umpire games, leaving me little time to train the younger umpires. My thanks to Jack Curry and Leo Gauthier for their assistance.

A special thanks to our umpire coordinators, Clorissa Herman and Michael Sanfilippo. After having spent this past season and seeing the issues, I would like to implement these suggestions for next year: We need to designate an umpire "trainer" that strictly works with the younger umpires. This trainer needs to work with the UIC and the scheduler. There were many occasions where the umpires on the field were not performing at their best. I believe this was due to improper training and no on-field supervision. They just didn't know what to do under certain circumstances. That is on us as trainers.

I am also proposing that we conduct additional umpire clinics starting early in the spring, for training these younger umpires. Not just for 4 hours in one day as is currently being done.

Recruitment of younger umpires is another issue that we need to address. I would like to work with some of the schools and some of their athletic personnel or principals. They can help identify people who would be willing to attend the clinics.

I would like to start with that process early in the new year.

Although my beginning here was quite stressful, I did enjoy working with the umpires and especially the board. I look forward to the next year and hopefully with changes the umpiring situation will be lot easier for all of us, especially the umpire schedulers.
